Poster Contest Rules

Please read the following contest rules carefully. Only posters that meet the contest rules will be considered.

Deadline

Poster files or images and release forms should be received by Recycle Colorado **no later than April 19th, 2024**. You will receive a confirmation that your poster has been received on the day of or after the submission deadline. Winners will be notified the week following the deadline.

Eligibility

All students (kindergarten through high school) in Colorado public and private schools (including home schools) and youth organizations are eligible.

Poster Requirements

Posters or images of creations must be original artwork by students. Copyrighted characters (such as Superman) or copyrighted clip art will not be accepted.

Materials: Students may use a variety of media, such as watercolor, pen and ink, crayon, markers, or computer graphics. Artwork should be easy to see, read and understand. Students are encouraged to incorporate upcycled or recyclable materials in their creations. Landscape (horizontal) or Portrait (vertical) layout will be accepted. Images Layout: of creations or posters in .jpg, .png, .pdf format will be accepted. Release Form: Each poster or creation image must be accompanied by a completed release form (see page 8). A poster not accompanied by a completed release form will not be eligible for further judging. Submission: Only electronic submissions are accepted (scanned copies or photos of hand-drawn posters). The electronic submission should capture the original poster or creation without editing, and images should be clear (not blurry)

Theme

Students are encouraged to incorporate the theme "Trash to Treasure" into their artwork (see theme explanation on page 4). Students are encouraged to either create a poster demonstrating the possibilities of upcycling or develop a creative innovation out of upcycled materials and take a picture of it for submission.

Judging Procedure

The posters will be grouped into one of the following five grade categories:

- Kindergarten through 2nd grade
- 3rd through 4th grade
- 5th through 6th grade
- 7th through 8th grade
- 9th through 12th grade

The best poster from each grade category will be selected based on the judging criteria listed below. One finalist will be awarded in each grade category.

Judging Criteria

- 1. Conveys clear message through text and artwork. (25 points)
- 2. Exhibits creativity, originality and artistic quality. (25 points)
- 3. Displays visual clarity and correct spelling easy to read and understand. (25 points)
- 4. Addresses the theme listed on page 4. (25 points)

Depending on funding, additional winners or other prizes may be announced.

Theme for 2024 Trash to Treasure

Upcycling or "creative reuse" is the process of using trash or unwanted products in a new way, giving them a second chance. For example, after you use the pasta sauce in a glass jar, you can clean the jar and use it as a pencil holder or cup. The possibilities are endless with upcycling. It not only benefits your community and the environment, but also your future!

Is reuse better than recycling?

Reusing and recycling are both very similar processes that give materials a second chance to become something new and help save our planet. However, reusing a material uses less energy than recycling which is better for the planet. Think about what happens after you put something into a recycle bin: A truck comes to pick it up, the truck brings it to the recycling center, where it is sorted by humans or robots, and then the material is made into a new product. That's a long process! With reuse you already have the item in your possession and it takes less energy to make it a new product.

What are ways I can upcycle at home or in school?

Upcycling can be fun for you to do at home or at your school. You can use what you already have to upcycle. No need to buy anything! You can upcycle something into a new creative way or as a replacement for something you use everyday. Replacing something you would buy with something you reuse is a great way to upcycle. The image below has some examples of upcycling to give you some inspiration.

Talking Points for Teachers on Upcycling & Reuse

Did you know that most materials in your home and school, including the materials used to build them, can be reused or upcycled instead of being thrown away. What do you know about upcycling?

- Do you creatively reuse something in your home or at school?
- Do you have any reuse stores in your community? These are stores that give materials a second chance to be used. Some common items found at these stores are clothes, art supplies, furniture, and building materials. See the list we have provided below to find a store in your area.
- Can you think of a way to upcycle a material in your classroom or home in an everyday way?
- Can you think of a way to upcycle a material in your classroom or home in a creative way?

What are the benefits of upcycling?

- **Reduces the amount of waste going to the landfill.** Landfills have a limited lifetime. By reducing the amount of things we send to the landfill, we can extend the life of our landfills, saving space for future generations.
- **Reduces greenhouse gas emissions.** By reusing what you already have, you can help to reduce the amount of energy and emissions created from producing new products and from disposing of old ones.
- Helps to conserve natural resources. The things you buy at the store use natural resources from our planet to become something new. We can reduce our impact on our planet by using what we already have to make something new that we need.
- Supports small businesses & innovations. Many people have been able to develop a small business by creating and selling upcycled products.
- **Creates unique, new products.** Upcycling is great for shoppers because it creates unique, one of a kind products that are different from what you can find at the store.

The power of reducing AND reusing!

Reducing is the first step you can take to protect our planet. By using what you already have, fixing broken things, or turning something old into something new, you accomplish two things that will help reduce your impact on our planet!

Businesses built around reuse and upcycling

Businesses that have a focus on reuse and upcycling are continuing to gain traction and pop up in communities around Colorado and online. With more people wanting to do the right thing, these stores or online shops make it easy to do so and you support local and small businesses as well.

Some people upcycle clothing, silverware, and household decorations to make new art. You can find these folks online or at craft fairs which are fun ways to engage with artists in your community.

The most common business that you have probably heard of is reuse stores or thrift stores. While these stores do not always turn products into something new for you to buy, they are a great way to get materials back to someone to buy and reuse it instead of it going to the landfill. Thrift stores, flea markets, and antiques shops are great places to find clothing, furniture, household items and vintage things.

Did you know that there are craft and building supply thrift stores in Colorado? Crafting thrift stores are a great resource for teachers and students to get materials for their classrooms and projects. Most supplies are sold at a discounted rate too! Building material reuse stores are great opinions for families looking to reduce their impact when making renovations or building something.

Donating to a reuse or thrift store is super easy. First, find the items you would like to donate and have an adult help you load them up to bring to the store. Make sure your items are not broken, stained, torn, or have a ton of damage. Have an adult help you bring your items to the store and locate the "Donation Drop Off" area. These are usually near the back or on the side of the building. Have an adult or worker help you unload your items. They will let you know if they can or cannot accept certain items. Once you are done you can receive a receipt for your donation if you would like, otherwise you are all set!

Refill stores and bulk refill stations are popping up around Colorado and in your local grocery stores. They are a fun new way to shop. A refill store allows customers to bring in their own containers to fill them up with food and other household products. This is a great way to help eliminate single use packaging and to reuse containers that you may have. Every refill store offers different things to buy and fill up on. Some offer spices, noodles, nuts and snack foods, coffee and tea, body care, pet supplies, cleaning supplies, baking supplies, and much more. If every American purchased coffee from bulk bins, we could divert 260 million pounds of just coffee packaging from landfill each year!

The first time you go to a refill store, be sure to ask the worker how it works so they can walk you through how to refill in their store. Typically you bring in your container and weigh it at their weigh station. You can write the weight of your container down on a piece of paper or on a sticker to put on your container. Then go and fill up your container with only ONE item per container. Repeat this for multiple products and containers. Once you are done, bring your full containers and their original weights up to checkout.

You can also find bulk sections at everyday grocery stores such as King Soopers and Sprouts! Simply bring your own container (make sure to weigh it first) and fill up on everyday pantry staples such as rice, oats, nuts, freshly ground nut butters, and much more. This eliminates packaging waste and enables you to upcycle old containers such as pasta jars and jam jars.
