# Compost Guidelines for Stormwater Protection

Brief messages to be shared alongside updated composting guidelines to educate and support community members in protecting waterways while maintaining their compost bins.

# Residents

## Short

• When washing compost containers, dump wash water into indoor sink drains or directly onto landscaped areas. Never allow wash water to enter roads and storm drains.

## Longer - Talking Points

- Nutrients and bacteria in food waste and chemicals from soap will harm water quality and aquatic life.
- If using a bin washing company, select a company that collects/reclaims the wash water.
- When washing compost containers, dump wash water into indoor sink drains or directly onto landscaped areas.
- If washing compost containers outdoors, never allow wash water to enter roads and storm drains. Use biodegradable or phosphate-free soap and dump wash water onto landscaped areas.
- For easy maintenance, use a small container to store compost indoors and transfer it to larger bins outdoors for pick up. You are allowed to use small CMA-approved compostable bags. Bags must be three gallons or smaller. <u>Check out A1 Organics'</u> website for a list of accepted bags.
