

HISTORIC PLASTIC POLLUTION REDUCTION ACT SIGNED INTO LAW!

On July 6, 2021, Governor Jared Polis signed HB21-1162, the Plastic Pollution Reduction Act into law, the second most comprehensive law in the country. Prior to HB21-1162's passage, 10 states had plastic bag bans and 7 states had polystyrene foam bans.

With the signing of this bill, Colorado becomes the first state in the U.S. to strike a state plastics preemption law, restoring the right of local municipalities to enact their own plastic regulations.

What the new law will do:

- Charge a \$0.10 fee on plastic and paper carry out bags at large grocery and retail stores (restaurants and small Colorado-only stores with 3 or fewer locations are excluded) starting Jan. 1, 2023. The retailer will keep \$0.04 of the fee to implement the program and municipalities and counties will get \$0.06 of the fee to implement and enforce the law as well as use it for recycling, composting and waste diversion programs and education.
- Ban plastic carry out bags at large grocery and retail stores (restaurants and small Colorado-only stores with 3 or fewer locations are excluded) *starting Jan.* 1, 2024.
- Ban polystyrene food containers and cups at all restaurants and schools starting Jan. 1, 2024.
- Allow municipalities and counties to enact, implement and enforce more stringent bag and polystyrene laws and enact, implement and enforce laws that prohibit, restrict or mandate the use or sale of plastic materials, containers, packaging or labeling starting July 1, 2024.
