

Mesa County Solid Waste Landfill

The Mesa County Landfill opened in 1986 and is owned and operated by Mesa County. The landfill is designed with a 126-acre "footprint" for waste disposal, with nearly 60 acres of the "footprint" now covered with waste materials. Visit the waste management area, including the landfill, hazardous waste collection facility and organic materials composting facility and learn about the county's education program.

Grand Junction Recycling

Visit three recycling facilities in Grand Junction:

- Grand Junction's recycling center is a one-of-a-kind multi-stream processing facility operated by Curbside Recycling Indefinitely. The city provides curbside service to more than one quarter of the city's solid waste customers.
- Western Metals Recycling shears, bales and sorts ferrous and nonferrous scrap metal.
- Waste Management operates the dual-stream materials recovery facility and electronics drop-off location in Grand Junction.

We understand the importance of fresh thinking, but innovation that works on the Front Range doesn't necessarily work in rural Colorado. Our statewide huband-spoke models have yet to yield truly regional programs and facilities in rural areas. This session focuses on three of the most successful and long-term regional rural recycling programs in operation today.
